Dr. Lester Kurtz is Professor of Sociology at the University of Texas at Austin where he teaches peace and conflict studies, comparative sociology of religion, and both western and nonwestern social theory. He was previously director of Religious Studies at Texas and holds a Master's in Religion from Yale Divinity School and a Ph.D. in Sociology from the University of Chicago. He is the editor of a 3-volume Encyclopedia of Violence, Peace and Conflict (Academic Press),

co-editor of Nonviolent Social Movements (Blackwell's), and The Web of Violence (U. of Illinois Press) as well as author of books and articles including Gods in the Global Village (Pine Forge/Sage), The Politics of Heresy (U. of California Press), and The Nuclear Cage (Prentice-Hall). He is currently working on a book on Gandhi's legacies and is working on a documentary film, "Peaceful Warriors," with James Otis, narrated by Martin Sheen. He has lectured in Europe, Asia, Africa, and North America and is the past chair of the Peace Studies Association as well as the Peace

and War Section of the American Sociological Association



Dr. Yvette Rosser has a B.A. and M.A. in South Asian Studies. Her master's thesis investigated the content of non-western cultures in World History textbooks used in US high schools. Her Ph.D. dissertation at The University of Texas at Austin in the Department of Curriculum and Instruction, "Curricula as Destiny: Forging National Identities in

India, Pakistan, and Bangladesh" looked at education, the politicization of historiography, and social studies textbooks in three nations of the Subcontinent. She has experience with K-12 curriculum development, has organized numerous educational seminars concerned with teaching about non-western cultures, and has several publications on that topic. She is the cofounder of the Day Without Violence, a program designed to infuse conflict resolution training in schools and to establish the study of the processes of peace as a central aspect of educational and research agendas. Dr. Rosser currently is a Research Fellow at the Observer Research Foundation, where two books have been published, "The Islamization of Pakistani Social Studies Textbooks" and "Indoctrinating Minds: A Case Study of Bangladesh". She is presently editor of forthcoming volumes, "The Voices of Sindh", featuring Sindhi perspectives of history, economics, politics, and the diasporic community and currently coordinating a program about the life and teaching of Khan Abdul Ghaffar Khan, the "Frontier Gandhi". Dr. Rosser is personally and professionally dedicated to promoting an accurate and empathetic treatment of the nations on South Asia and hopes that her life's work will bring regional peace and prosperity to the Subcontinent and cultural understanding world-wide. She lives in Austin, Texas with her loving children who are almost grown-up.



Gul A. Agha is a professor at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign. He is active in Sindhi-American organizations and has lectured at numerous Sindhi gatherings around the world.
